The first phase of The Bentway is located on lands that are part of Fort York National Historic Site, recognized by the Government of Canada as being of national significance.



letter from our co-executive directors

MODERN CITIES ARE often thought of as hard, fast-paced, and alienating places. Not just because of the concrete and steel that built them, but with social isolation on the rise, cities are becoming increasingly difficult places to live.

The Bentway's Summer 2024 program, *Softer City*, explored "softness" as a means of humanizing our cities, connecting communities, and creating space for collective repair. Together, we asked:

- How can we reimagine city-building based on new, softer strategies?
- How can public art and shared spaces contribute to the well-being of neighbourhoods?

The program proposed a series of soft encounters —with our city, our infrastructure, and one another.



Walking:Holding

Rosana Cade's project was a unique, experiential performance that invited audience members (one at a time) on a guided walk through the neighbourhood, where they encountered and held hands with a series of people along the way. It was a gentle invitation between strangers, provoking the question: what happens when we open our hands to each other in public?



Tracings

Anishinaabe artist Nico Williams applied "patches" (made with woven fabric and jingle cones) to the chipped sections of the Gardiner's concrete columns, incorporating traditional Indigenous regalia designs. This collective mending reminded us of the ongoing importance and responsibility of care for our infrastructure, and by extension, care for one another and our city.






Holding Space

Nnenna Okore created a new intimate space for connection within the monumental architecture of The Bentway. Woven within scaffolding, Okore used Ankara, a versatile African fabric, to embody a deep sense of identity and community. Vivid fabric hues juxtaposed with the Gardiner's hard edges and softened the concrete infrastructure, inviting visitors into moments of warmth, reflection, and shared experience.



Wind Ensemble

Toronto-based artist Heather Nicol's interactive work captures the movement of the wind and energy of the city. Brightly coloured windsocks danced overhead while windchimes echoed throughout. Vibrant podiums invited visitors to add their own voices to this chorus, encouraging moments of pause, reflection, and connection to the surrounding landscape.



Social sketching

Launched last year in partnership with Noble Space, our free (and sold-out) weekly Art Socials welcomed participants of all ages and abilities to explore a range of artistic techniques together, including screen-printing, watercolours, letterpress, and more. The series fostered creativity, connection, and a sense of community through shared artistic practice.

DRAWING FROM THE Softer City learnings, our Rx for Social Connection report helped reveal the essential role public spaces play in the public health ecosystem.

Here, The Bentway teamed up with research partners from Gehl (New York) and the Dalla Lana School of Public Health (at the University of Toronto). Through observations, surveys, and interviews, the findings revealed that public spaces and public programs are critical health tools to not only promote well-being, but reduce feelings of loneliness.

well-being, social connection, and public space

Reflecting on a rich collaboration, The Bentway's Co-Executive Director Ilana Altman spoke with Julia D. Day (Partner and Director, Gehl New York) and Dr. Kate Mulligan (Founder and Scientific Director of the Canadian Institute for Social Prescribing; Associate Professor at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health) to chat about our shared research into the power of public space.







- ILANA (IA): You each bring a unique and important lens to this work. What motivated you to partake in this research and what inspired the development of *Rx for Social Connection*?
- for opportunities to form interdisciplinary partnerships and gather evidence that highlights the power of public space in addressing our physical or mental health, economic opportunity, or safety. While Gehl has led several assessments to document impacts of public space on access to play or sense of belonging, we had not done so in partnership with a school of public health. This presented a unique opportunity to tell a more compelling story about the power of place on our health.
- KATE (KM): As a health geographer, I've seen how deeply our health and wellbeing are shaped by relationships—with other people, with place and nature, with arts and culture, and with ourselves. When healthcare and public space folks join forces like this, we can unlock new ways of thinking, doing and being, to build stronger and more connected communities.

- IA: Kate, your team led the Public Health Survey, engaging visitors to better understand how The Bentway's spaces and programs affected their sense of wellbeing and connection. What stood out to you most in the responses from community members?
- KM: We learn a lot when we simply ask people what's important to them, and really listen to—and act on—what they value. What stood out from this survey was how simple people's needs are: many said just being at The Bentway made them feel less alone, that comfortable seating and accessible paths helped people connect and feel at ease, that volunteering gave them a sense of purpose and contribution. It's a reminder that simple, thoughtful designs and programs can go a long way toward welcoming people and showing that they matter and belong in public spaces.
- IA: Julia, your team led the Public Life
 Observation Study, analyzing visitor
 movements and activities on site. Were
 there any findings from this work that were
 unexpected or surprised you?
- Jp: The findings affirmed the importance of the most standard of urban design features, such as human scale lighting, greenery, and seating. Yet what stood out for us was that the research also illustrated how important these physical qualities are to our sense of connection and belonging. Another was the importance of both hard and soft infrastructure in making a place inviting. Yes, we need quality in the physical design of a place, but we also need reasons to visit a place—we need invitations and culturally sensitive programs that draw us out of our homes or away from screens and making connecting and lingering feel easy, safe and fun.

TO CLOSE OUT the *Softer City* program, we produced one of our most ambitious and resonant projects to date. *Dominoes*, created by Station House Opera, brought Torontonians together in an epic act of urban joy and community building.

Over 21,000 attendees joined to witness the unfurling of 8,000 giant-sized domino blocks, hand-placed along an epic 2.5km path. This kinetic social sculpture stretched from King West to STACKT Market, through Canoe Landing Park and Choice Properties' West Block, under the Gardiner, in and out of local businesses and homes, and ending spectacularly with a plunge into Lake Ontario.

The project brought together hundreds of volunteers and linked diverse communities along the waterfront in a symbolic as well as physical chain of cause and effect. A fleeting event, *Dominoes* left a lasting impression on all those who experienced it, demonstrating the immense potential of art to inspire and connect communities, bringing a sense of exuberance and civic pride to the streets of Toronto.



- ILANA (IA): We were delighted to have Choice as the Presenting Sponsor of *Dominoes*, one of our most resonant and far-reaching projects to date. Can you share more about what excited Choice about this project and what the partnership meant for you?
- **ORIT (OS):** Choice is dedicated to creating places where people thrive. Through our social impact work and placemaking efforts, we seek to transform our neighbourhood retail centres into the hearts of their community. We wanted to support such an exciting effort and weave West Block into the broader neighbourhood in a fun and dynamic way.
- IA: As a real estate trust, you are uniquely invested in how communities grow through placemaking and social cohesion. How has your partnership with The Bentway informed your approach to working in community at your other sites across the city?
- **os**: From design to implementation, there is this energy and dynamism that we've all come to expect from programs and exhibitions under the Gardiner. That's been inspiring for us as well

in our own efforts to build community through placemaking. We believe that everyone, no matter where they are and what they're doing, is entitled to an injection of joy in their lives. 



MICHAEL (MC): What does a place like The Bentway mean to you personally, and how do you see it touching the lives of the constituents you represent?



мс: When we opened in 2018, it seemed to signal the start of how Toronto can think of old infrastructure in new ways. What do you think communities everywhere can learn from The Bentway story?

cg: Ken Greenberg had the vision to see the potential of the derelict space under the Gardiner. The Bentway is such a gorgeous space and has become almost cathedral-like. There is so much more potential yet to be discovered in the city.

Mc: Our Winter 2025-26 season is fast approaching, and we're excited to welcome new skaters to our site. If people haven't yet taken a spin around the trail, what would you tell them that they might not know about the experience of skating under the Gardiner?

cg: It's a great way to meet people! Many who are new to the country may be afraid of winter and this shows that winter can be wonderful and something to embrace. Tell people to tell their friends to get out there!

Phase 1 of The Bentway was just the beginning!



THE EXPRESSWAY RUNS elevated for 6.5km and past 17 downtown neighbourhoods, moving more than 140,000 vehicles every day. But how can a highway be *more* than a highway?

This year, we continued to advance our creative work to further unlock opportunities along the Gardiner's length. In April, Toronto City Council adopted the <u>Under Gardiner Public Realm Plan (UGPRP)</u>, formally marking The Bentway's next chapter as leaders on a comprehensive vision for underutilized public spaces below and adjacent to the highway, from Dufferin to the DVP.

Together with city-builders like you, we can reimagine how this piece of infrastructure can connect, perform, and inspire.

After a rigorous RFP process, The Bentway was proud to select Canadian architects Brook McIlroy and their partners at Field Operations, the renowned NYC landscape architecture firm known for their work on The High Line.


The Bentway Islands will offer new opportunities for recreation, play, culture, and retail, while setting a new benchmark for climate-conscious, inclusive design. A multi-layered engagement process is guiding the project, including deep responsive consultation with Indigenous communities, local residents, local social services, and the City of Toronto.



incorporating indigenous design, histories, and knowledge

As part of this work, we're proud to collaborate with Brook McIlroy's Indigenous Design Studio to meaningfully place Indigenous design, landscape, and history within the space.

Robert McKaye (Senior Manager, Planning and Design) had a recent exchange with Ryan Gorrie (Principal, Brook McIlroy) to discuss our ongoing work together.

ROBERT (RM): The Bentway is thrilled to be working together with your team on the design of The Bentway Islands. To start, can you tell us more about Brook McIlroy's Indigenous Design Studio—who you are, how do you work, and how you approach your practice?

RYAN (RG): The Indigenous Design Studio at Brook McIlroy is a specialty area of practice that focus' on supporting Indigenous practitioners in connecting with projects that seek to embed Indigeneity within the design and delivery. The studio also strives to create a collaborative environment with non-Indigenous practitioners within Brook McIlroy as well as other firms we team up with.

RM: The project aims to meaningfully integrate Indigenous perspectives, narratives, and design principles into the public realm.

Why is this important for cities today – particularly in shared public spaces?

RG: As many are aware the ongoing impacts of colonization has led to an erasure of Indigenous presence and identity, from scales of the


individual to whole territories. While this has been acknowledged via various avenues such as the TRC and UNDRIP, the uptake varies from place to place. Public spaces offer the opportunity to render Indigenous presence visible and integral to the everyday of all who use the space. Cities are often built on places where Indigenous nations had previously settled or moved through regularly as part of their territory. It follows that the enduring presence of these nations should be part of the experience of these places within the urban context.

RM: Can you talk about your findings at the Bentway Islands site? How does the Indigenous Design Studio engage important stories and histories?


RG: Topics that have emerged from site and consultation include original shoreline, flora and fauna from the area, land acknowledgment, Indigenous nations representation/history and artist/vendor spaces. Overarching themes related to animal-human connection, plant relationships and embedding Indigenous layering throughout the site all became part of the conversations around ideas.

RM: The project also looks to Indigenous present and futures in Tkaronto, and once complete, this site will welcome tens of thousands of visitors every year. What do you hope visitors feel, learn, or reflect on when they visit The Bentway Islands?

RG: I hope that visitors will see and feel Indigenous presence directly, they will learn more and want to find out more. I hope people will understand what it means to be in relation to people, other than human beings and the current and historical context. I hope that people will return for annual events in all seasons to see how dynamic the site and programming can be. Finally I hope that other cities will take notice and lead opportunities within their own contexts, that this might be a lasting model for bringing together various layers of culture, history and inhabitation.




introducing the gardiner corridor alliance

Together, our shared impact falls in the fastest-growing area in the country. With 44 active and recently-completed projects, the corridor is also anticipating completion of the Ontario line, redevelopment of the Port Lands, and major construction to repair the Gardiner.

Daniel Winberg, a new Bentway Board member, recently connected with Dave Carey (Co-Executive Director) to reflect on the GCA and what he's looking forward to as we continue to grow.

DAVE (DC): Why launch the Gardiner Corridor Alliance (GCA), and why now?

DANIEL (DW): We're at a pivotal moment in Toronto's evolution. The Gardiner corridor is undergoing a once-in-a-generation transformation, with over 44 active and recently completed private developments, major civic projects like the Ontario Line and Port Lands redevelopment, and the City-approved Under Gardiner Public Realm Plan. The GCA was launched to bring together the people shaping this future — across sectors — to collaborate, share ideas, and ensure we're building something truly impactful, and building that together.

DC: What sort of companies are part of the Alliance, and where are they having impact?

pw: Alliance partners represent a huge range of fields with impact from Dufferin to the DVP, from Liberty Village to the Port Lands, including: real


estate; finance; architecture, design, and planning; law; engineering; construction; and public agencies. Collectively, our shared impact falls into the fastest-growing area in the country.

DC: We kicked off the GCA with an incredible launch event earlier in 2025. Tell us about that.

pw: The launch was a powerful moment: not just a celebration, but a statement of intent. We heard from incredible speakers like Jason Thorne (Toronto's new Chief Planner), Saad Usmani (Toronto Region Board of Trade), Mary Rowe (Canadian Urban Institute), and your colleague llana Altman (The Bentway), each offering a unique perspective on the corridor's potential. It was inspiring to see so many leaders come together around a common cause, and to feel the energy of a new alliance forming.

DC: We've got a wonderful set of inaugural GCA partners, including Choice Properties, Aird Berlis, EllisDon, Wallman Architects, and of course your own Rockport Group. If someone wanted to support or get involved with The Bentway—as a GCA member or otherwise—what would you say to them?

bw: I would say—"let's go"! The Bentway is more than a public space, it's a movement. Whether you're a developer, designer, or simply someone who cares about the future of Toronto, there's a place for you here. The GCA offers access to a network of like-minded city-builders, professional development, exclusive events, and the chance to help shape one of the most exciting urban transformations in Canada.

Our Co-Executive Directors, Dave Carey and Ilana Altman, were joined onstage by Asima Jansveld, Chief Program and Engagement Officer at Friends Of The High Line, to look at global models of industrial reuse and how Toronto can unlock new civic possibilities beneath the Expressway.

This event was supported by Manulife and The Waterfront BIA, who have both been long-time supporters of The Bentway's growth.









IN A NEW corporate partnership, Sephora's Beauty at The Bentway opened in June 2024, transforming an underused space at the eastern edge of our Phase 1 site into a dynamic, community hub.

Outfitted with welcoming community assets like bike racks, benches, and tables, plus 42 different plant species, the space invited neighbours and visitors alike to pause and connect with their surroundings. Alongside the installation, a series of free community classes activated the site, offering hands-on workshops in Kundalini-inspired movement and Kintsuqi pottery.

This partnership highlighted The Bentway's collaborative spirit working with diverse partners to create new opportunities for connection and civic engagement.







introducing our new board treasurer

Rita Said reflects on her recent appointment as our new Board Treasurer during a crucial period of transition and planning-for-growth. She sat down with our staff's financial Controller, Tessa Chan, to discuss what drew her to the organization and what opportunities lie on the horizon.





Rita Said, District Vice President, Scotiabank.

TESSA (TC): Before joining the Board as Treasurer, you sat on our Finance & Audit Committee for several years before. What initially drew you to The Bentway?

RITA (RS): Since moving to Toronto, The Bentway is now local to me and it has become so clear that communal spaces are key to our city. They bring people together and connect us.

tc: How does your experience in commercial banking and risk management shape what you bring to The Bentway?

RS: The experience I have in commercial banking provided me with a deep understanding of creditworthiness and capital structures, enabling sound oversight of The Bentway's budgets and funding strategies. From a risk management perspective, I bring a forward-looking perspective, while anticipating emerging risks that could impact long-term sustainability.

Tc: Let's look ahead. What are some Bentway opportunities we can look forward to this year?

RS: On a very practical, financial front, we're continuing to diversify our revenue streams, including enhanced focus on earned revenues (like event rentals and low-cost ticketing models), which is in itself an opportunity to strengthen financial resiliency.

We're designing a second hub site, The Bentway Islands, which is a chance to grow our impact and footprint.


